the wall paintings from the west house at mycenae are discussed in relation to their context within the building their iconography and stylistic details are explored in relation to other aegean bronze age wall paintings the fragments are fully cataloged and illustrated with drawings and photos

this book presents recent research on ancient silk road wall paintings providing an up to date analysis of their coloring materials and techniques and of developments in efforts to preserve them the destruction of the bamiyan buddhas in 2001 encouraged international collaboration between conservation research institutes to study and protect the silk road s painted heritage the collaborations led to exciting new discoveries of the rich materials used in wall painting including diverse pigments and colorants and various types of organic binding media in addition comparative research across the region revealed shared painting practices that indicate the sophisticated exchange of technologies and ideas in parallel with these advances in technical understanding greater awareness and sensitivity has been fostered in endeavors to preserve this fragile heritage the book offers insights obtained from conservation projects and ongoing research that encompass the geographical regions and periods related to the silk road including from japan china korea india and afghanistan and countries of the eastern mediterranean region it also discusses the current issues and future challenges in the field featuring concise chapters the book is a valuable resource for students and professionals in the field of cultural heritage preservation as well as those who are not familiar with the fascinating topic of silk road wall painting research

the book reproduces the cleaned paintings for the first time it also describes and analyzes their amalgam of coptic egyptian christian byzantine and arab styles and motifs as well as the religious culture to which they belong in 1996 funded by the united states agency for international development and at the request of the monastery of st antony the antiquities development project of the american research center in egypt began the conservation of the paintings in the church the paintings revealed by the conservators are of extremely high quality both stylistically and conceptually while rooted in the christian tradition of egypt they also reveal explicit connections with byzantine and islamic art of the twelfth and thirteenth centuries some newly discovered paintings can even be dated back to the sixth or seventh century

anna lea merritt s little known mural paintings of the life of christ for the church of st martin s blackheath in surrey provide the focus for this book merritt 1844 1930 was a successful and prolific artist best known as the first female painter to have work purchased for the nation by the chantrey bequest now the tate collection a pioneer in her day she successfully ventured into the male dominated world of professional art this book by acms member olive maggs celebrates the recent restoration and is the first study on the murals examining both their iconography and the little known water glass technique used in their making

although in the last few years the study of painting in 19th century iran has made considerable progress it still remains somewhat tradition bound it would seem that art historians find it difficult to go beyond oil paintings lacquer and enamel in 1998 robinson the doyen of qajar art history wrote qajar painting found its most prestigious outlets in oil painting lacquer and enamel in this study it is shown that paintings were probably the most important form of expression for painters for many centuries and as prestigious as the other forms of painting mural paintings were very popular and were to be found on various types of buildings ranging from the royal palaces private homes bath houses to a religious shrine painting was a craft and a business that was actively pursued by artisans in most major towns in response to a general demand for figurative art as to the themes depicted these remained basically limited to i dynastic and epic qajar family portraits battles hunts shahnameh scenes ii sensual flora fauna erotic and iii religious prophets imams olama subjects these subjects occurred in any type of building irrespective of its function the wide use of figurative representation in religious buildings and practice is of great interest people almost invariably assume that moslems until recent times did not tolerate paintings and the like of humans and animals adorning public and private buildings and publications this study shows otherwise there is even evidence of the use of paintings as religious icons which is a totally neglected subject rock reliefs and other forms of sculptured works in and on buildings and its accessories such as doors show a similar development as mural paintings although information is even less copious than for wall paintings it is clear that the depiction of living beings in the forms of sculptures was very widespread and pre dates the qajar period the nature and form of murals were influenced by the increased contacts between persia iran and the outside world in particular europe and india this holds in particular for the use of prints and the occurrence of european scenes in frescos and other forms of paintings willem floor has written extensively on many aspects of social economic and art history of iran

the medieval wall paintings that remain in english churches are for the most part shadows of their former selves the rare fragments of this beautiful art to

have survived not only the reformation but also successive waves of iconoclastic zeal and unsympathetic restoration the whitewashed walls of most parish churches belie the riot of colour and decoration that once adorned them but the remnants of paintings tucked into corners or rescued from later layers of paint help us to understand the role of art in medieval religion roger rosewell here offers a guide to the role played by medieval wall paintings as religious didactic and commemorative works of art telling the stories of those who created them and those who used them on a daily basis he also compares and contrasts religious and domestic wall paintings using beautiful colour photography throughout

the twenty papers collected in this book explore over 500 years of secular wall paintings right up to contemporary work looking at why and how they were painted and the best ways of caring for them to ensure that future generations can also find in al

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
